In addition to all this, the past two months have witnessed significant progress in Ekal's mission through organizational meetings, social activities, forest visits, and cultural and social programmes.



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


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From 2005 onwards, Ekal started focusing on the self-dependence of villages. A target was set that four lakh villages should be prepared with education, health, development, and awareness, and be equipped with the cultural values of the land, so that they could become truly self-reliant. The day this target is achieved, India will undoubtedly emerge as a leading country of the world. This dream has filled full-time Ekal workers with renewed vigour, and each one of them

The third and most important part of Ekal is its Central Working Committee. It is divided into three parts:

- 1. Gram Sangathan Kendriya Samiti (Village Organization Central Committee or GSKS)
- 2. Akhil Bharatiya Pratinidhi Mandal (All India Representative Board or ABPM)
- 3. Kendriya Yojna Core (Central Yojna Core or CYC)





Similarly, to evaluate and assist with decisions to be made at lower levels of the organization, a **Board of Representatives** is formed. The board ensures that the decisions taken by the Central Working Committee are implemented at all levels of the organization. It also reviews these decisions at the implementation level and, if required, makes suitable improvements. In fact, such boards of representatives have been constituted almost at all levels of the organization. At the national level is the **Akhil Bharatiya Pratinidhi**

The Organizational Base of Ekal Abhiyan

is taking responsibility for five to seven Ekal schools, ensuring that villages become self-dependent as early as possible. This dream-inspired mission has been named 'Gram Swabhiman Dayitva.' As part of this pledged responsibility, every dedicated worker tours his or her adopted village, carefully examines the functioning of the Ekal schools directly or indirectly, and then visits every household in the village along with members of the village committee to listen to the problems and challenges faced by the villagers.

The Central Working Committee ensures that all rules and regulations of the mission are followed properly. It is the mind of the mission. It thinks, deliberates, and then takes decisions concerning the mission. The Central Yojna Core works with volunteers, designs programmes for them, assesses all aspects, and then submits its proposals to the Central Committee of the Village Organization. The village committee meticulously scrutinizes these proposals and then sends them back to the Central Working Committee, which takes the final decision on them.

Mandal (All India Representative Board or ABPM); then follow the Kendriya Karyakari Mandal (Central Working Board), Sambhag Karyakari Mandal (Divisional Officers Board), Bhaag Karyakari Mandal (Section Officers Board), and Anchal Karyakari Mandal (Zonal Working Board). All these boards have competent office-bearers and dedicated volunteers. They converge into a group that supervises their work and ensures that the assigned projects run smoothly and are completed successfully.



The top decision-making body in the Ekal organization is the Central Working Committee. The lower decision-making bodies are the Abhiyan Samitis (Mission Committees) that are formed by the CWC. These committees, hierarchically, are: Sambhag Abhiyan Samiti (Department Mission Committee), Bhag Abhiyan Samiti (Sub-Division Mission Committee), Anchal Abhiyan Samiti (Zonal Mission Committee), and Sanch Abhiyan Samiti (Cluster/Block) Mission Committee). The Abhiyan Samiti consists of volunteers from urban organizations, rural organizations, as well as full-time volunteers. The coordination among these three types of committed workers helps in making sound decisions and preparing blueprints for their successful implementation. Each committee has the authority to send its suggestions and proposals to its senior committee. Besides, the Abhiyan Samiti enjoys the following rights: they can take all decisions pertaining to the selection of workers, their promotion, allocation of various tasks, and ensuring that all decisions taken by the CWC are effectively implemented. The senior members have granted decisionmaking powers to the committees so that volunteers at all levels feel empowered and trusted. The volunteers thus develop a strong sense that the organization believes in their capability to complete projects successfully.

In 2012, the working mechanism of the Ekal system was transformed in an unprecedented way. Considering the possibility that Ekal might otherwise evolve into a complex web of overlapping committees, it was decided to establish a single umbrella body that would oversee all Ekal organizations.

Thus, the **Ekal Abhiyan Trust** came into being. All the working Ekal units were linked to this trust. The CWC of this trust created various new Abhiyan Samitis, and it was mandated that all newly formed committees would have to be reorganized every two years. It was also resolved that these committees would shoulder the responsibility of controlling and supervising the working of the Ekal cadres who operate under them.

Ekal has deliberately used terms like **Karyakarini** and **Samiti** for a technical reason. Both words denote differences in the functioning of committees. All Ekal units at the urban and rural levels form their own working committees that aim to connect people from all sections of society with Ekal. Meanwhile, the committees formed by the Ekal Abhiyan Trust are limited in number and function as decision-making groups for various Ekal units. The committees formed at the zone, division, and unit levels essentially perform the following five functions:

- 1. To act as a communication bridge between the Centre and the village.
- 2. To sign off on all projects and allocated funds at every level so that accountability and responsibility are ensured.
- 3. To safeguard the quality of Ekal schools by acquiring requisite knowledge and arranging proper training for teachers.
- 4. To maintain financial discipline within the committee itself and ensure that all units under it follow similar protocols. The committee also ensures that the schoolteacher is paid on time and that the members, preferably women attached to the committee regularly check on the well-being of the teacher's family in a cordial manner.

Additionally, the committee must encourage its workers to become self-dependent and create livelihood opportunities in the villages.

5. To enhance the workability of a volunteer by boosting his or her morale. The best way to achieve this is to appoint a committee member as a **Guardian (Abhibhavak)** and seek his advice in the functioning of the committee.

Thus, Ekal has carried the blessings of this land since the very beginning of its mission. The uniqueness of this mission lies in the fact that it was not designed and directed from the top but emerged organically from the grassroots. Whatever experiences were gathered while working in the villages gradually evolved into the working mechanism of Ekal. The Ekal Abhiyan Trust formulates its policies, and its Central Working Committee implements them through the rural organization. Ekal has an aura that naturally attracts students and villagers towards it—an innate charisma lacking in most government welfare schemes.

In 1990, the first booklet was written on the Ekal Abhiyan. This publication made it clear that Ekal was devoted to providing functional education to villagers and vanvasis and to winning their hearts through dedicated efforts. It declared that Ekal would unite villagers to bring about meaningful change in their lives and uplift their standard of living. Once these villagers are awakened in the truest sense, the country will be able to resolve many of its long-persisting problems, which have continued only due to a weak rural structure. Ekal is steadily and firmly moving in this very direction.

Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh

A Century of National Devotion





On Vijayadashami (October 2, 2025), the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh completed 100 years since its

establishment. The Sangh's journey of completing a century has not been easy. The Swayamsevaks, through their hard work, sacrifice, and dedication, overcame numerous oppositions and obstacles to earn the acceptance and support of society. Moreover, the cooperation and encouragement of countless individuals and institutions in society have made this journey smoother.

Sangh Founder - Dr. Hedgewar:

The Sangh was founded by Dr. Keshav Baliram Hedgewar on Vijayadashami of Vikram Samvat 1982 (September 27, 1925) at Nagpur (Maharashtra). Dr. Hedgewar, the founder of the Sangh, was a born patriot. He was actively involved in all movements related to India's freedom struggle. During his medical studies in Kolkata, he was an active member of the Anushilan Samiti.

In the year 1921, he was sentenced to one year of rigorous imprisonment for his participation in the Non-Cooperation Movement, and in 1930, he joined the Salt Satyagraha, for which he was imprisoned for nine months.

Objective of the Sangh's Establishment: The objective behind the establishment of the Sangh was to organize the entire Hindu society and to make India a capable and supremely glorious nation. To achieve this goal, there was a need for virtuous, disciplined, patriotic, upright, and dedicated workers. To create such workers, Dr. Hedgewar developed within the Sangh a simple, unique, yet highly effective daily method known as the "Shakha."

Through this system, the Sangh has produced millions of capable workers who, for the past 100 years, have been working in various spheres of social life to fulfill this objective.

Expansion of Sangh Work:

Throughout this journey, the Sangh has crossed the paths of ridicule and opposition, ultimately earning society's

acceptance, support, and cooperation. The Sangh has succeeded in gaining the trust of society due to its noble foundation, excellent working system, and the selfless, patriotic, and harmonious conduct of its Swayamsevaks.

Today, the Sangh's work is visible everywhere and in all fields. At present, daily Shakhas are being held at 51,740 locations across 98 percent of the districts and 92 percent of the blocks in India, totaling 83,129 daily Shakhas. In addition, through 32,147 weekly meetings held at 26,460 other locations, the Sangh's nationwide work continues to expand steadily. Of these 83,129 daily Shakhas, 59 percent are student (youth) Shakhas.

Steps Towards Social Transformation: To achieve its goal, the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh first established an organization in the initial phase. It worked to build confidence within society that the Hindu society can be organized, can walk together in one direction, step by step, and can raise the collective chant of "Bharat Mata Ki Jai."

The Sangh succeeded in this effort. In the Nagpur training camp of 1940, Swayamsevaks from every state of the country had gathered for training. Addressing the participants of that camp, Dr. Hedgewar had said,

"Today, before my eyes, I see a miniature form of the Hindu Nation."

When the clouds of Partition began to loom over the country, there was an extraordinary attraction and unshakable faith in society towards the Sangh. The

Swayamsevaks took upon themselves the protection of Hindu society, as well as the arrangements for food, shelter, and rehabilitation of refugees.

After independence, in 1948, due to political reasons, the then Congress government dared to impose a ban on the Sangh, attempting to suppress it. However, the Swayamsevaks compelled the government to yield by organizing peaceful Satyagrahas through democratic means, leading to the lifting of the ban on the Sangh.

The inspiration for India's freedom movement was based on the idea of "Swa" (the Self) — and it was essential that every sphere of national life be built upon that same foundation of Swa. With this vision, in the second phase, inspired by the Sangh, Swayamsevaks began to work in various fields such as education, students, labor, politics, agriculture, tribal welfare, arts, and others, through different organizations.

Today, more than 32 organizations like Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi Parishad, Vidya Bharati, Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh, Bharatiya Kisan Sangh, Vanvasi Kalyan Ashram, Seva Bharati, Sanskar Bharati, Laghu Udyog Bharati, Swadeshi Jagaran Manch, and Pragya Pravah are active in national life and are carrying out numerous successful experiments in social transformation within their respective fields.

Service Activities: Swayamsevaks always remain active in addressing social problems and challenges according to their ability and capacity. Filled with patriotism and a spirit of service, Swayamsevaks rush to the aid of society the moment they witness its suffering. That is why, even today, during any natural or other calamities, they reach the affected areas immediately and engage wholeheartedly in serving the people.

Not only during times of disaster, but Swayamsevaks also make continuous efforts, according to their capacity, to alleviate the deprivation, pain, and neglect visible in society. Therefore, in its third phase, the Sangh decided to give greater momentum and a more organized form to its service activities.

During the birth centenary year (1988–89) of the Sangh founder Dr. Hedgewar, funds were collected for this purpose. Today, with the cooperation of society, the Swayamsevaks are running 1,29,000 service projects across rural and urban areas focused on education, health, values (sanskar), and self-reliance for the underprivileged sections of society. In these efforts towards social transformation, the Swayamsevaks are receiving abundant cooperation and support from the community.

In addition to this, without depending on the administration or the government, Swayamsevaks are working under the concept of "Gram Vikas" (village development) — with the goal that all villagers together should undertake the holistic development of their own village.

They are also engaged in "Gau Sanrakshan Evam Sanvardhan" (cow protection and promotion) by preserving and improving Indian breeds of cows, while imparting training, awareness, and encouragement to farmers for organic farming.

The Mantra of 5 Transformations (Panch Parivartan): Swayamsevaks of the Sangh, while adopting the Sangh way of life within their families, continuously strive to bring about positive, socially aligned changes. Along with this, they regularly undertake various initiatives for broader social transformation.



After completing its centenary year, the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh is entering the next phase of social transformation, which will be a large and extensive movement of social awakening. In this phase, Swayamsevak's will advance towards working in unison with the virtuous forces of society.

For this purpose, to create social awareness and to inspire individuals and families to bring these ideals into daily life, the Sangh will emphasize five key areas, collectively called "Panch Parivartan" (Five Transformations):

Social Harmony (Samajik Samrasta), Environmental Protection and Enrichment (Paryavaran Sanrakshan evam Sanvardhan), Family Enlightenment (Kutumb Prabodhan), Self-reliant Living (Swa Aadharit Jeevan) and Sense of Civic Duty (Nagrik Kartavyabodh)

These five themes are essential today for the unity, integrity, and welfare of humanity and society.

For the past hundred years, this great endeavor (Mahayajna) has been continuing uninterruptedly. The objective of the Sangh's work is to bring enduring transformation in society by organizing the entire community to address the challenges and problems faced by the nation, and to build social systems suited to the needs of the era.

However, our country is vast, and no single organization can alone bring about permanent change. This period of Amrit Kaal calls upon us all to set aside our differences, unite, and work diligently to make our sacred motherland strong and supremely glorious.

Ekal In Southern Uttar Pradesh



Under the Ekal Abhiyan, a total of 2,626 Ekal Vidyalayas are being operated across 10 Anchals and 109 Sanchs in the two regions of Southern Uttar Pradesh Division – Prayagraj and Bundelkhand. In these schools, 37,226 boys and 36,898 girls are receiving education and value-based learning. In 148 Ekal Vidyalayas of 6 Sanchs, e-learning through tablets is being provided. Through the management of one Integrated Village Development Programmememe (IVD), the Ekal Gramothan Foundation of

India has created employment opportunities for villagers.

Additionally, three tailoring centres and two Ekal on Wheels units are providing employment-oriented training. Within the division, 30 Vyas Kathakars, including two Rath Kathas, are actively spreading religious and cultural awareness. Across the entire division, 10,994 nutrition gardens (Poshan Vatika) and 5,711 soak pits have been constructed. With the inspiration of the Ekal Abhiyan, 52,164 trees have been planted, and villagers are ensuring their proper maintenance.

In 59 villages across 2 Sanchs, 29 Aarogya Sevikas are working to take care of villagers' health and well-being. During my travel across the division, I visited 8 out of the 10 Anchals, witnessed firsthand the Panchmukhi Shiksha (five-dimensional education) of Ekal Abhiyan, interacted with villagers, and recorded what I saw and heard.

After reading this "Ground Zero" report, you too will feel gratified to know that the Ekal Abhiyan has left its indelible mark—from the land of confluence (Sangam) to the land of Buddha, and from the valiant soil of Alha-Udal to the holy land of Sri Ram at Chitrakoot.





Nurturing Childhood through Education and Values



In the Bundelkhand region, Ekal Vidyalaya began its operations in Jhansi anchal in 2013. At present, 223 Ekal Vidyalayas are being run across 10 sanchs (clusters) of this anchal. As one enters the village of Tilaiha in the Baruasaagar sanch, signs reading "Ekal Vidyalaya this way" can be seen everywhere — from mud-brick houses to

electric poles. Following these signs leads you precisely to the place where, every evening from 3 to 6 p.m., the Ekal Vidyalaya operates.

Thirty-five-year-old Acharya Pratibha Kumari, a well-educated woman (B.A., D.Led), imparts her knowledge and experience wholeheartedly to the children. Though all thirty students attending the Ekal Vidyalaya also go to the government school in the village, here they receive not only education but also moral and value-based learning with practical life lessons.

Four-year-olds Shivansh, Mehak, Mahi, Kanha, and Sanskar; five-year-olds Aryan, Divyansh, and Roshni; seven-year-olds Prince, Anjali, and Poorvi — and many others — attend the Ekal Vidyalaya with great enthusiasm. Under Sanskar Shiksha (value-based education), they are taught Saraswati Vandana, Omkar, Matri Pranam, Hanuman

E-Education Sparks a New Interest in Learning

Although the standard of education in India's rural areas has improved, government schools still lag in the use of technology. In such a scenario, where many government-school children do not even see a computer until grade 10, Ekal Vidyalaya children — as young as four or five — are already learning through tablets



under the E-Shiksha (digital learning) initiative.

The Ekal Vidyalayas in the Pratapgarh anchal of the Prayagraj region began operations in 2008. Today, 255 Ekal Vidyalayas are being run across 10 sanchs of this anchal. Among them, the Patti sanch has been designated as the E-Shiksha sanch, where tablet-based education is being provided in the Ekal Vidyalayas of 30 villages — including Nauhi, Mahdaha, Usrauli, Sahaspur, Pahlmapur, Raipur, and Bardi.

Thirty-five-year-old Acharya Sharda Devi, trained in E-Shiksha, teaches her students using tablets with the proficiency of a skilled educator. Sanch Pramukh Ms. Rajni Saroj also supports her during her visits.

In the Ekal Vidyalaya of Mahdaha village, 30 children are enrolled, and all feel delighted to study using tablets. The new technology has increased their curiosity and interest in learning. Most of these children also attend government schools and proudly speak about the Ekal Vidyalaya's E-Shiksha initiative there.

Village Head Sri Sharda Prasad, former Pradhan Sri Mata Prasad, committee members Sri Vijay Kumar and Sri Balmukund, along with other villagers, regularly review the functioning of the Ekal Vidyalaya. As a result, the educational level and practical understanding of these children are notably higher than that of their peers in government schools.





Chalisa, and the importance of respecting elders. Under Shiksha (academic learning), they study materials aligned with their school curriculum, while also learning life skills and the art of joyful living through play — guiding them toward becoming good citizens in the future. Yoga, Pranayam, and traditional games are also part of the Ekal Vidyalaya curriculum.

Similarly, in the Prayagraj region, 293 Ekal Vidyalayas are being run

across 11 sanchs of the Phoolpur anchal. During my field visit, I reached the Ekal Vidyalaya at village Mansi Khurd in the Phoolpur sanch, where children greeted me enthusiastically with "Jai Sri Ram!" Among the eager learners were Irfan, Kanha, Shabnam, Anurag, Anupam, Fatima Bano, Vansh, Vrisha, Garima, Kartik, Aryan, and Alfiya.

Acharya Sunita Devi (B.A. in Sanskrit) teaches them with heartfelt dedication. The children of committee

member Ms. Sanju Devi also study in the Ekal Vidyalaya. Another committee member, Ms. Vinita Pushpakar, shared that the Ekal Vidyalaya's method of teaching deeply reinforces moral and cultural values in children. Through games and interactive learning, they acquire knowledge effortlessly. The school also welcomes children who do not attend government schools, and after learning here, they attain the same level of education as their peers in formal institutions.

Rural Prosperity Through Self-Reliance - The Success of IVD



In Karma village of Chaka sanch, located in the Yamunapar anchal of the Prayagraj region, the Ekal Gramothan Foundation of India has been successfully running an Integrated Village Development (IVD) programme. Under this initiative, multiple vocational and developmental activities are carried out — including sewing centers, computer training centers, Ekal on Wheel, beautician courses, farmer outreach and training programmes, production of organic manure, construction of organic pits, farmer meetings, creation of nutrition gardens, tree plantation drives, and observance of World Environment Day. In addition. one-month vocational courses in

plumbing (22 trainees) and electrical work (32 trainees) were also conducted.

Since its inception on April 14, 2019, the IVD center has empowered 439 women through tailoring courses, 655 children through computer training, and 32 girls through beautician training. A total of 1,278 farmers have received organic farming training, 80 organic pits have been built, and 1,278 nutrition gardens have been established across the region. Through IVD, a satellite center has also been set up in Balapur village, where 320 girls have already completed sewing training. Today, the IVD center in Karma has extended its reach to nearly 60 villages.

IVD Project Manager Sri Shubham Kushwaha shared that plans are underway to launch a three-month course in personality development and communication skills through the IVD programme.

The IVD center also houses the Swami Vivekananda Youth Club Study Center, established under the guidance of IVD Chairperson Smt Shashi Poddar.



The center's library contains biographies of great personalities, books on history, tourism, religion, and culture — available for everyone to read within the premises (though borrowing books outside is not permitted).

Five "Kisan Mitras" (Farmer Friends) have been appointed to connect with local farmers, guide them in organic farming practices, and inform them about IVD schemes. The Kisan Mitras — Sri Kashi Prasad, Sri Pramod Kumar Goswami, and Sri Narendra Kushwaha — work actively under the guidance of Farmer Trainer Sri Sujeet Kumar Namdeo, bridging knowledge and empowerment across the villages.





These Women Are Becoming Economic Pillars for Their Families

In the Bharatkoop Sanch of the Chitrakoot Anchal under the Bundelkhand region, a Women Empowerment Center—a Tailoring Training Center— is being operated. The center's coordinator, Sri Mahendra Singh, shared that the Bharatkoop tailoring center has been running since April 10, 2023, equipped with seven sewing machines. A total of 20 girls are learning stitching in two batches daily.

Additionally, through this center, a sub-center with five sewing machines has been functioning in Bhainsaundha since February 2025, where 20 girls receive daily training. Apart from this, satellite centers have also been established in Baglai, Raipurwa, and Dholbaja Badri ka Purwa villages, each with two sewing machines, training 10 girls daily at each location.

Through these centers, Ekal Abhiyan has earned a respected reputation in Bharatkoop, continuously receiving strong community support. Around 20 nearby villages have now become directly connected with Ekal Abhiyan through these initiatives.

The tailoring instructor, Ms. Shyamkali Vishwakarma, has been training girls since the center's inception. To date, she has trained over 150 girls in tailoring. Alongside teaching at the center, Ms. Shyamkali also undertakes stitching work from her home, earning a decent income.



During my visit to the Bharatkoop center, I met Ms. Ram Mani (18 years), Ms. Pooja Devi (17 years), Ms. Parvati (35 years), and Ms. Gudiya (16 years) — all trained under Ms. Shyamkali. Each of them now earns 2,000–4,000 per month through tailoring work from home, supporting their families' livelihoods. All these women come from farming families, and their additional earnings provide vital financial stability to their households.

Similarly, in the Kanpur Anchal, a tailoring center has been running since November 2020, where more than 150 girls have received training under Ms. Sangeeta Devi, who also serves as an Ekal Vidyalaya Acharya.

Rural Children Getting Computer Training through Ekal on Wheel



In the Kanpur region of Bundelkhand, the Ekal on Wheel initiative has been operational since 2022 with the objective of providing computer education to rural children. The bus, equipped with nine laptops, enables eighteen students to learn computers at a time. Trainer Sri Saurabh Kumar shared that so far, 557 children from the region have been trained through 39 batches. At present, Ekal on Wheel is running three batches, two of which are for students at government schools in Tikra and Maksudabad.

The programme has been contracted with the Office of the Basic Education Officer until March 2026, under which computer classes for these schools are conducted inside the Ekal on Wheel bus. Once the contract with these schools ends, new schools will be contacted for future collaborations. The third batch is currently running for rural children in Bhikar village.





Ekal E-Rickshaw: A Mobile Computer Training Centre

An innovative initiative has been launched in Kanpur under the leadership of Dr. Anuradha Varshney, Head of the Women's Department of Kanpur Chapter, with the department's support — a moving computer training centre set up in an e-rickshaw.

Started on July 17, 2024, this project is named the E-Rickshaw Digital Literacy Training Programme. The e-rickshaw is equipped with 10 laptops, which are charged within the vehicle itself, and is accompanied by a trainer. The e-rickshaw visits both government and non-government

schools under contract and conducts computer classes for children using these laptops.

So far, it has reached 12 government schools across 12 villages, training 654 children through 17 batches. Currently, five batches of students are undergoing computer training. The programme is implemented in collaboration with IIT Kanpur, under which children who complete their training are awarded certificates issued by IIT Kanpur. So far, 480 children have received certificates, and the remaining 174

students will be awarded shortly. This Ekal E-Rickshaw is truly a mobile digital classroom, taking technology and learning directly to the doorsteps of rural children.



Beautician, Computer & Tailoring Training - IVD's Pathway to Empowerment

The beautician course, launched just three months ago at the IVD center in Karma, is already transforming lives. The instructor, Ms. Aastha Dubey, is herself a proud graduate of the same center, having earlier completed both sewing and computer training there. The current batch consists of 32 young women, many of whom have a long association with the IVD center — learning sewing and computer skills before now advancing to beauty training.

The computer training lab, a cornerstone of IVD's vocational initiative, is led by Sri Shivam Kumar, who has been associated with the center since 2019. In recognition of his dedication and skill development work, he was honored with the "National Builder Award 2025" by the Rotary Club. Beyond teaching, Sri Shivam actively assists his students in finding employment opportunities after training.

Several of his students have gone on to achieve remarkable success:

- Sri Anuj Patel, now the Office Head at Ekal Vidyalaya Foundation of India, Prayagraj Chapter, also completed advanced courses in Tally and accounting here.
- Sri Abhishek Patel, after completing computer and advanced training, became a computer instructor at GRC Gajraula and now teaches underprivileged children in his village.
- Sri Ankush Yadav joined the team as an Ekal on Wheel trainer.
- Sri Brajesh Gautam turned his digital training into a thriving ecommerce business, earning a substantial income through online product marketing.

The tailoring center, run for the past three years by Ms. Savita Sahu, currently trains 25 girls across three batches. Her former students — Ms. Shanti, Ms. Bharti, Ms. Nisha Yadav, Ms.

Indu Patel, Ms. Radha Kotary, Ms. Deeksha Kothari, and Ms. Divya Patel—have successfully started their own small tailoring businesses, contributing meaningfully to their families' income.

To further support self-reliance, 19 economically disadvantaged girls were provided with sewing machines free of cost, ensuring that financial constraints do not hinder their pursuit of skill and livelihood. Additionally, three girls received bicycles through Rotary Club Midtown, Prayagraj, enabling them to commute easily to the center for training.

IVD Karma — Lighting the Lamp of Self-Reliance Across Villages

The IVD Center at Karma has ignited such a strong spirit of self-reliance in the region that boys and girls from even distant villages eagerly participate in its various programme. The center requires no external publicity — those who once become part of it naturally inspire and bring others along. In the truest sense, these very villagers have become the real brand ambassadors of IVD.





Arogya Project — A Blessing for Rural Health





In 28 villages of Bithoor Sanch, under the Kanpur Division of Bundelkhand region, the Arogya Project has been successfully running for the past four years under the Ekal Arogya Foundation of India. Through the consistent efforts of the project, the use of toilets in villages has significantly increased — today, over 70% of the villagers have begun using toilets built in their own homes.

The Ekal Arogya Sevikas (health volunteers) actively spread awareness among villagers about disease prevention and the use of herbal medicines. Many nutrition gardens and herbal gardens have also been established across villages, promoting healthy living and self-sustainability.

During my visit, I had the opportunity to meet Arogya Project workers and interact with villagers in Pratappur village, gaining first-hand insights into their experiences and the project's impact. Arogya Sevika Ms. Kiran has been efficiently managing

project activities not only in Pratappur but also in the neighbouring Meetanpur village.

Ms. Kiran shared that Pratappur has a population of around 500 people. The village has a government school up to grade five but no health center. Although one doctor is available, he remains overburdened with work — thus, attending to the community's health needs has become the primary responsibility of the Arogya Sevikas. She also mentioned that an Anaemia Control Programmememeis being implemented in the village.

Sanch Coordinator Ms. Kalpana Yadav informed that currently 14 Arogya Sevikas are working across 28 villages to ensure the smooth functioning of the project. Meanwhile, Regional Arogya Project Head Ms. Janki Sharma shared that a total of 29 Arogya Sevikas are serving in 59 villages across the two Sanches of Bithoor and Maitha under the Kanpur region.

In Bithoor Sanch, the Sevikas have undertaken several impactful activities, including establishing 55 herbal gardens, 19 nutrition gardens, organizing 3 awareness rallies, creating 2 organic pits, writing 16 wall messages, motivating 131 families to adopt toilet use, providing home remedies to 293 villagers, conducting telemedicine screenings for 313 villagers, and planting trees at 25 different locations.

Arogya Sevika Ms. Kiran also manages data collection and screening through the Telemedicine App and Arogya App. She has been equipped with basic medical instruments provided by the project, enabling her to conduct routine health check-ups such as blood pressure, temperature, blood sugar, and weight monitoring. Her presence in the village has proved immensely beneficial — resolving most of the community's common health issues locally and promptly.





Honoring the Soldiers - Ekal Abhiyan on the Field of Gratitude

To honour the brave soldiers who have dedicated their lives to the defence and service of the nation, Ekal Bharat Lok Shiksha Parishad, Kanpur Chapter, organized a Soldier Felicitation Ceremony in the village of Kakwan, under Kakwan Sanch. During the ceremony, the following veterans and soldiers were honoured for their invaluable service: Sri Aditya Pratap Singh, Sri Ram Asrey, Sri Rampal Singh, Sri Upendra Singh, Sri Sudheer, Sri Nishant, Sri Balster, Havaldar Fauji, Sri Harmohan, Sri Ram Sewak, Sri Shivshankar, and Sri Rambabu Pandey. Families of some serving soldiers were also felicitated on the occasion.

The event was graced by Committee Chairperson Dr. Anuradha Varshney, Dr. Ankur Singh, Smt. Chhaya Gupta, Smt. Neeta, Sri Ram Kripal, Regional Abhiyan Head Sri Lalit Kumar, Sanch Pramukh Smt. Disha Singh,





along with several Ekal Acharyas, officebearers, and villagers.

The ceremony commenced with the lighting of the ceremonial lamp by exservicemen and committee dignitaries. Village Head Sri Raju Bhaiya lauded this noble initiative of the Ekal Abhiyan and extended heartfelt thanks to everyone involved. The event was jointly conducted by Regional Abhiyan Head Sri Lalit Kumar and Chapter Office Incharge Sri Ashish. Delivering the welcome address, Dr. Ankur Singh remarked,

"This ceremony is dedicated to those valiant warriors who placed their motherland above all else and safeguarded our nation's borders. Though we can never truly repay their service, devotion, and courage, we can at least express our deep gratitude through this gesture of honour." He further shared that in Kakwan Sanch, this is the third major event following the Van Yatra and tree plantation drive, each receiving active support from the villagers.

"This clearly signifies that Ekal Abhiyan has now become one with the village community," he said. "In the coming days, we plan to initiate village development activities focused on women's self-reliance and empowerment in the Sanch villages." At this occasion, Dr. Anuradha Varshney, Head of the Women's Wing, Kanpur Chapter, said: "Today, we have gathered to honour those brave hearts and their families who devoted their very lives in service to the Motherland. Their valour and sacrifice remain a beacon of inspiration for all of us."

Awakening Social Consciousness through Satsang and Katha

In the Chitrakoot Anchal of Bundelkhand Bhāg, Southern Uttar Pradesh, 215 Ekal Vidyalayas are being operated across 10 Sanchs, where 6,584 children are receiving not just education, but also moral and cultural values. Beyond education,

this Anchal places special emphasis on value-based and cultural enrichment activities.

During my visit, I reached the village Nibhour under Baberu Sanch to witness the activities of the Sri Hari

Rath Yojana firsthand. There, I met Sri Akhilesh Kumar, Head of the Sri Hari Rath initiative, who shared that the programme has been running in Bundelkhand since 2019, yielding deeply positive results.







Agreat deal of work has been done in the region to foster social harmony. Several village temples have been renovated with the joint efforts of the Ekal Gram Samiti and local villagers. The arrival of the Sri Hari Rath rekindles the villagers' connection with Sanatan Dharma, encouraging them to rediscover their spiritual roots.

In August 2025, the Rath visited 20 villages, where Gram Devata Pujan (worship of village deities) was organized, attended by 170 villagers.

Similarly, village festivals were celebrated in 20 villages with participation from 1,005 villagers. During these events, 16 villagers took an oath to give up intoxicants, 129 families joined the 'Hanuman Parivar', and 171 villagers received copies of the Hanuman Chalisa.

Despite heavy rain, villagers of Nibhour joyfully participated in a Kalash Yatra organized as part of the Sri Hari Rath programme. Over 50 villagers, carrying sacred pots on their heads, joined the two-kilometer-long procession, culminating in worship at the village temple before the Sri Ram Darbar installed in the Rath. After the Aarti of Bharat Mata, everyone received the tilak, tied sacred threads (Kalawa), accepted prasad, and returned home with devotion and delight.

At first glance, such an event may appear ordinary—but in truth, it is profoundly significant. In many rural regions, due to growing disdain or ignorance toward Sanatan traditions, both internal and external forces are attempting to alienate simple villagers from their faith, rituals, and values.

The Ekal Sri Hari Satsang Samiti is playing a vital role in protecting villagers from such influences and reconnecting them with their cultural and spiritual heritage. Alongside, the Samiti also works actively to promote social harmony and eradicate social evils and superstitions.

Devotional Ambience Created by the Ekal Sri Ram Katha

On the first day of Navratri, under the auspices of the Srihari Satsang Samiti, a one-day Ekal Sri Ram Katha was organized in village Bani Khas of West Sarira Sanch, under the Kaushambi Anchal. A large number of villagers attended the event. All six Vyas Kathakars of the Anchal — Sri Suraj Bhan, Sri Nagendra, Sri Girish Chandra, Sri Man Singh, Sri Bal Govind, and Sri Sushil Kumar — mesmerized everyone with their devotional bhajans.

The complete arrangements for the Sri Ram Katha were made by Gram Pradhan Amarnath Saroj and the Gram Samiti. After the conclusion of the Katha, prasad was distributed among all



participants. The entire village was enveloped in a devotional atmosphere due to this event.

In managing the Sri Ram Katha, Anchal Abhiyan Pramukh Sri Sanjay Kumar Sahu, Anchal Samiti Vice President Sri Ramakant Dwivedi, Sanch Pramukh Smt. Ranjana Srivastava, and other dedicated workers played an effective role. These spiritual gatherings help foster harmony, social unity, and collective spirit among the villagers.





Acharya Excelling in Both Education and Organic Farming



In the Hamirpur Anchal of Bundelkhand region, 235 Ekal Vidyalayas are being run across 10 Sanchs. In village Jaisukhpur of Kadura Sanch, Ekal Acharya Smt. Vimla Devi not only manages her school effectively but also leads an awareness campaign promoting organic farming in her village.



Anchal Activity Head Sri Mahesh Kumar, himself a farmer trained in organic agricultural practices, mentors Smt. Vimla Devi in the nuances of organic methods. Together, they conduct training sessions for other farming families in the village.

At her own home, Smt. Vimla Devi has developed a Poshan Vatika (nutritional garden) where she grows vegetables for her family using organic methods. She has also created an organic compost pit. Additionally, she prepares Jeevamrit — a natural bio-fertilizer — by mixing cow urine, dung, gram flour, jaggery, and soil, covering it in an earthen pot for 48 hours before use in her garden.

She also teaches local women how to make Jeevamrit and, through her consistent efforts, has inspired every household in the village to establish their own Poshan Vatika

During my visit, I witnessed an Ekal Vidyalaya session in this village. The children attend with great enthusiasm. Three-and-a-half-year-old Prince comes to school with his brother. Observing Acharya Vimla Devi's teaching, he has already learned the Hindi and English alphabets and counting to thirty. He even sings Ekal songs confidently, performing before other children without hesitation.

benefiting nearly 9,000 people, with ripple effects touching tens of thousands more.

- Integrated Village Development (IVD): Weaves health, education,

- and livelihood together for holistic growth, contributing to SDGs 3, 4, 8, and 17.
- Vocational Empowerment (SDC): Prepares youth and women for diverse, sustainable income streams.
- Plantation Drives: Advance environmental consciousness and biodiversity under SDGs 6 and 13.

Ekal Yuva Udaan 2025 A Journey of Learning, Friendship, and Hope



The Ekal Yuva Udaan (EYU) program is a youth exchange initiative that connects students from the USA and India through skills, culture, and values. Its vision is to create a bridge where both sides give, learn, and takehome memories that last a lifetime.

From August 11–15, 2025, five students from the US joined this journey.

- Myra Tyagi, Mihir Bhat, and Rohan Gandhi - travelled to Songadh, Gujarat.
- Mahi and Myra Bijoriya travelled to Chhindwara, Madhya Pradesh.

Songadh Gramothan Resource Center (GRC) - Technology, Arts, and New Discoveries: For the Songadh team, the day began with a two-hour bus ride from Surat. Those rides became the first classroom - filled with conversations, anticipation, and curiosity about what awaited at the GRC. On arrival, every day began with a heartfelt welcome from the students

and staff, making the US students feel right at home.

Myra Tyagi - Painting & First Friendships: Myra, just 13, took on the role of an art teacher. She guided the GRC girls in painting, helping them express creativity for the very first time. At the same time, she also learnt Mehndi designs from the Indian girls — a small cultural exchange that broke the ice and created instant bonds.

"Even though it pushed me out of my comfort zone, I'm proud I did it. Everyone was so welcoming, and their smiles made me feel at home." - Myra Tyagi

Mihir Bhat - Technology & Problem-Solving: Mihir introduced students to the world of Raspberry Pi, sensors, and coding. Together, they built projects with LEDs, buzzers, and motion detectors. The highlight was an Independence Day special tricolor LED project, symbolizing India's flag glowing in the dark. Beyond technology, Mihir

also joined Rohan in teaching basketball, watching the children grow in confidence with every dribble and shot.

"It was more than just teaching programming or electronics. It was about sparking curiosity and showing how technology can be a tool for creativity." – Mihir Bhat

Rohan Gandhi - Sports & Community Connection: Rohan brought basketball to Songadh - a sport completely new to the kids. Starting from basic dribbling and passing, he saw the children quickly pick up the game, their joy lighting up the court. Rohan also co-led computer sessions with Mihir, teaching coding and problem-solving. For him, the real magic was the connection with the community - sharing meals with families, visiting farms and cow shelters, and experiencing India's warmth at every step.

Vanyatra - Learning from Ekal Schools: One of the most moving parts of the Songadh programme was the Vanyatra, where the team visited nearby Ekal schools in tribal villages.

Here, they met children with very few resources but an abundance of spirit. The US students watched performances of traditional songs, dances, and Sanskrit shlokas, all offered with joy and pride. The simplicity of the schools, the resilience of the children, and the warmth of the community left a deep impression on the US students and their parents.

Paunar, Chhindwara – Art, Crochet, Dance, and Compassion: In Madhya Pradesh, sisters Mahi and Myra Bijoriya carried the spirit of art and service to the classrooms of Paunar. Together, they transformed blank walls into murals, yarn into gifts of hope, and shy classrooms into lively spaces of dance and laughter.

Mahi Bijoriya - Hats for Hope: Mahi introduced her project "Hats for Hope", teaching students how to crochet colorful hats and blankets for rural babies. Despite the difficulty, the kids kept trying and proudly held up their first creations. She also guided





them in painting a vibrant mural that now brightens their school walls.

Myra Bijoriya - Colors & Dance:

Myra led painting workshops where children created their first artworks and a handprint tricolor canvas as a symbol of unity. Along with Mahi, she also taught dance, and together they performed with the students on Independence Day, making it an unforgettable celebration.

His mother, Smt. Shanti Devi, was a deeply pious and compassionate lady. known for her helping nature and moral uprightness. Sri Nandkishore Maheshwari, was a respected businessman of Jamshedpur, known not only for his business acumen but also for his close association with social, cultural, and religious organizations. Growing up in such an inspiring environment, young Ramesh was introduced to the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) Shakha during his childhood. Freedom fighters stand upon two enduring pillars — spiritual conviction and political vision. Without one, the other remains incomplete. Just as Gandhi's political movement cannot be understood without his moral faith, Haipou Jadonang's life too reflects this inseparable harmony of spirit and resistance.

Jadonang called for a spiritual and social revival. He established the Heraka movement (meaning "Pure") to reform and purify ancestral Naga traditions. It emphasized the worship of Tingkao Ragwang, the Supreme God, and discouraged superstitions and unnecessary sacrifices.



HAIPOU JADONANG An Untold Chapter of India's Freedom Struggle

Haipou Jadonang Malangmei (1905–1931), a Naga spiritual leader and political visionary from Manipur, founded the Heraka religious movement rooted in indigenous faith and declared himself the "Messiah King" of the Nagas. His movement spread widely across the Zeliangrong region, prior to the large-scale Christian conversions that transformed the area. Alongside his spiritual mission, Jadonang dreamt of an independent Naga kingdom - Makam Gwangdi or "Naga Raj" - a vision that inevitably brought him into conflict with the British colonial regime.

Early Life: Born on July 30, 1905, in Puiluan (then Kambiron) village of presentday Noney district, Jadonang belonged to the Malangmei clan of the Rongmei Naga tribe. He lost his father when he was just a year old, and his mother, Tabonliu, raised her children through farming. From early childhood, Jadonang displayed deep spiritual inclinations — spending hours in prayer and solitude. By the age of ten, he had gained fame across the Zeliangrong region for his dreams, prophecies, and knowledge of herbal healing. People from distant villages came to seek his guidance and listen to his teachings of renewal and faith.

The Heraka Movement: Disturbed by the rapid spread of Christianity, which he viewed as a form of foreign imperialism threatening traditional Naga culture, This revival became intertwined with the awakening of a pan-Naga consciousness — one that would later inspire the Naga National Council and the modern National Socialist Council of Nagaland (NSCN).

Resistance Against Colonial Rule: What began as a religious reform soon transformed into a movement of political awakening. Inspired by Gandhi's Non-Cooperation Movement, Jadonang urged the Nagas to unite beyond village rivalries and resist British oppression — which included forced labour, the annual 3 house tax, and harsh new laws.

In 1927, he planned to lead 200 Naga youths to Silchar to welcome Mahatma Gandhi, but Gandhi's visit was cancelled. By then, Jadonang had begun styling himself as the "King of the Nagas," moving through villages on horseback dressed in attire resembling colonial officers. In 1928, when a British officer demanded that he dismount and remove his hat, Jadonang refused — viewing it as a symbol of submission. His defiance led to his brief imprisonment in Tamenglong, which only heightened his popularity.

After his release, he organized a volunteer army named Riphen, which at its peak had 500 men and women trained in combat, intelligence gathering, and Heraka rituals. He also composed songs of freedom that were later popularized by his disciple, Rani Gaidinliu.

By early 1931, the British administration grew alarmed at reports of secret meetings and the collection of taxes by Jadonang's followers. Convinced that he was preparing for open rebellion, they decided to crush the movement. On February 19, 1931, Jadonang was arrested on his way back from the Bhuvan Caves and imprisoned in Silchar.

Trial and Execution: The British destroyed Heraka temples and publicly paraded Jadonang in chains to discredit his divine image. He was brought to Imphal Jail in March 1931. Accused of ordering the killing of four traders in 1930 — a charge his followers claimed was fabricated under coercion — Jadonang refused to confess or betray his movement.

On June 13, 1931, a colonial court sentenced him to death. On August 29, 1931, at dawn, Haipou Jadonang was hanged behind Imphal Jail near the Nambul River. He was only 26 years old.

Legacy: Though his life was cut short, Haipou Jadonang's vision of cultural renaissance and political unity ignited the spirit of Naga nationalism. His disciple, Rani Gaidinliu, carried his torch forward, ensuring that his dream of dignity, faith, and freedom remained alive in the consciousness of India's northeastern hills.
